### On The Journey of Holy Week!

"The Bible account of the last week of Jesus' life reads like a travelogue. But this would be no pleasure cruise for Jesus. This would be a monumental journey that would lead from one rocky road to another, to what seemed to be the end of the road with his cross and grave, but it ultimately ends with a bright path to paradise.

**Palm Sunday!** A donkey carries Jesus on a road covered in cloaks and flanked by palm wavers. "Hosanna!" and "blessed is he!" the people shout to Jesus along this way into Jerusalem. We join our voices with theirs to our humble king this day, but our praise is tinged with pain because we know a rough road is looming ahead.

**Maundy Thursday!** The disciples file out of the Upper Room and quietly make their way to the Garden of Gethsemane with their Lord and Master, Jesus. There we see Jesus pray before he is betrayed and arrested. We make our way to our places of prayer this day to confess that we have not always followed Christ, but we are ready to make his way our way again.

**Good Friday!** Bent over under the weight of the cross and stumbling on cracks in the pavement on the way, Jesus nears Golgotha, The Place of Skull, to be crucified. This is called the Way of Sorrows, and we see why. But we know, too, that this is the road that Jesus has to take if the weight of sin is ever to be lifted.

**Easter Sunday!** With trepidation, the women prepare to walk the road on Easter morning that leads to the tomb where Christ is buried. But as we walk with them down that same road we meet our risen Savior, who says to us, "Fear not! I am Risen!"

## **It's a Win – Win!**

During Rev Esther's sermon on March 20, she called the congregation to consider actively participating in the life of the church. She also mentioned the formation of the Nominating Committee for 2011. I will be representing the Board of Deacons on that Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee will be looking to the members of this Congregation for volunteers to fill some of the openings on the various boards and committees that manage the business and life of this church.

*Volunteering....participating....*let's be honest, for most of us when we hear these words our shoulders sag and we think, gee, I just don't have the time or talent to do that. Our lives are filled with the day to day business of work, children, our home, bills, unemployment, and illnesses and on and on. It's not a cop out; it's just a fact of life today. This all gets very stressful doesn't it?

Let me offer up this thought. Think about the last time you reached out to help someone, maybe a friend or neighbor, possibly a complete stranger? Maybe you visited someone who was sick and cheered them up a bit, served a meal at a soup kitchen, gave blood, walked for a cure for cancer, dropped some money in a homeless persons dish. The scenarios are endless. The bottom line is that you either directly or indirectly had a positive impact on someone's life.

Now think about how that made you feel. Didn't it make you feel good? Good about yourself. Didn't it give you a feeling of fulfillment? You made a difference. Didn't that crazy stress filled world you live in seem like a better and brighter place? For a time you enjoyed a renewed sense of happiness. There was an extra bounce in your step. You brought that home with you, to your work place, to your social life. Now some may believe this to be vanity or pride. I do not believe that. I believe this is God's way of rewarding us for caring and loving one another by bestowing a sense of joy and happiness within us.

**"We are a Christian Community of people who are reaching out to our neighbors, at home and abroad, sharing our faith and our resources."** Sound familiar? This is the mission statement of Central Square Congregational Church.

By volunteering to serve as a member of one of the boards or committees of this church you will have a positive impact on someone, somewhere. I urge each of you to consider serving in some capacity in the life of this church over the next few weeks as the Nominating Committee begins to solicit the congregation for volunteers.

It's a Win – Win! Someone, somewhere benefits from the generosity of your time or talent and you receive the blessings of God in return.

As I mentioned I serve on the Board of Deacons so I would like to throw a shameless plug here for the Board of Deacons. The Deacons perform a vital role in the church, no doubt, but no more vital than any other board in the church. We are just another part of the team that makes this all work. However, I have a sense that there could be some misconception or mystique about what a Deacon is responsible for here at CSCC. In our By Laws the description of the responsibilities of a Deacon starts off with, “responsible for ministering to the spiritual, pastoral and worship needs of the members of the Church and community.” Wow, pretty powerful stuff. And it's true. But it can be misleading to some. A big focus for the Deacons is the Parish Care Program. In short, we send cards, make a call or visit those in need; we also will deliver a meal or flowers if the need arises. There are many members in this church that do this as well without being a Deacon. That speaks to who we are. Deacons assist with the Sacrament of Communion by preparing and serving the elements to the congregation. Members of the Altar and Memorial committees assist the Deacons with these communion duties, as do other members of the congregation, when needed. Deacons assist the Pastor with the Sacrament of Baptism. Deacons work closely with the Pastor on matters of worship such as discussing potential changes to the Order of Worship, if needed, during some of the seasons such as Advent or Lent. What should be clear is that Deacons do *not* perform the Sacrament of Communion, or Baptism. Deacons do *not* perform sermons, or provide spiritual counsel to members of the congregation. Those are the sole responsibilities of the ordained Pastor. The Deacons do provide a vital role in the life of the church. Our By Laws provide that the Board of Deacons may have 9 members. We have 4. Clearly we need your help. If anyone has any interest or questions about being a Deacon please reach out to Carol Chaffee, Pat Lindsey, Dave Sheibley, Rev Esther or myself.

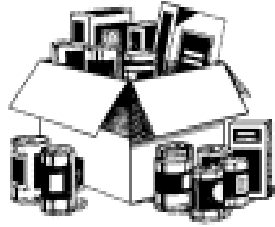
### **Easter Lilies**

## **Turn Metal into Food**

On Saturday, May 7, from 9:00a.m. to 12:00p.m., the First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church of Bridgewater will host a town-wide free metal recycling event. The event will be held in conjunction with the **Key for Hope Foundation**, a local non-profit group whose sole purpose is to give back to the community and improve the lives of those in need. All proceeds from the recycling event will be donated to the **Bridgewater Food Pantry**.

The metal pickup bin will be located in the First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church parking lot, adjacent to CVS on Plymouth St., just outside Bridgewater center. Volunteers will be on hand to help. Any items that attract a magnet (tools, pipe, refrigerators, a/c units, file cabinets, fencing, keys, etc.), as well as those that do not (aluminum gutters, for example) can be recycled free of charge. Both residents and non-residents are welcome. The event will be held rain or shine.

## MORTGAGE DEED THE CENTRAL SQUARE SOCIETY

A very old and very special document was returned to the church by Harold Estabrook this past December 2010. It is the original mortgage deed for Central Square Congregational Church, formerly called The Central Square Society, dated Feb. 7, 1868, and recorded in Plymouth County on March 17, 1868.

It reads, "In consideration of thirty two hundred dollars paid by Joshua E. Crane, Seir Walker, Lewis Hopkins, Yea M. Conant, John C. Alden, Abiel Bassett, Christopher D. Copeland, and James S. Alden, all of said Bridgewater....." It notes all the boundary points and refers to markers in degrees and rods and links to a stake or stone, two acres (more or less), known as the Asa P. Keith Estate. The thirty two hundred dollars was borrowed at an interest rate of 7% per annum.

The mortgage deed is filed: From: The Central Square Society, To: Joshua E. Crane & others, Dated: March 17, 1868

It is signed by then Treasurer, Albert G. Boyden. The mortgage was discharged as a duly executed deed in May 1884 and signed by Joshua E. Crane.

It is stated in the note by Harold Estabrook that the Central Square Society deed was given to the church by Ms. Charles Perkins of Bridgewater. Mr. Perkins (deceased) received the deed from his aunt's estate, Clara Crane, the daughter of Joshua Crane.

This deed is in remarkable condition and is quite a beautiful piece to witness. It will be displayed at coffee hour before it is placed in the book of records in the library hall at CSCC.

I have given some thought as to what happened to the deed to our church between the years of 1821 - 1860. I can only guess that perhaps that deed was destroyed in the great fire in 1860 when this church burned to the ground.

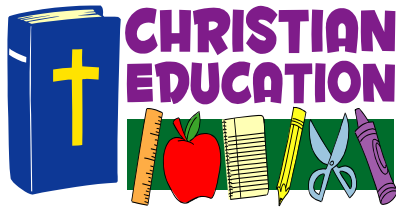

### **Adirondack Mission Trip and Dinner**

The Adirondack Mountains of northeastern New York provide endless opportunities for outdoor recreation. The Adirondack Park was created by the New York State legislature in 1882. It is comprised of 6.1 million acres—the size of the state of Vermont—and contains 85 percent of all wilderness in the eastern United States. The region also contains 3,000 ponds and lakes and 2,000 miles of hiking trails. The Adirondacks are home to 137,000 people year-round and 200,000 seasonal residents. Tourism, timber and mining remain the mainstays of the modern Adirondack economy and landscape. Tourists spend almost \$1.7 billion each year in northern New York, and an estimated 37,000 jobs are supported by both direct and indirect tourist dollars. The region is home to several small towns and villages, all popular vacation destinations for those seeking a respite from busy city life. But many year-round residents struggle with poverty.

Our Mission Youth will serve at the YouthWorks site located in the small community of Warrensburg, at the foothills of the southern Adirondacks. Warrensburg is home to 3,348 residents and is located closely to Lake Champlain, Lake George, Albany and the Adirondack High Peaks. Over 17 percent of the population lives below the poverty line. The Mission Youth will enjoy the hospitality and resilient spirit of the residents of this small town as they serve and minister to those in need.

The Mission Youth Team invite you to support them in their service by attending the Adirondack Lodge Mission Dinner on April 2nd at 6 pm. ## MEMORIAL GIFT GIVING

Your Memorial Committee currently consists of four members; Mary Damon, Dot Hull, Gloria Weinrebe, and Gail Wright. It is our charge to acknowledge gifts, both to the donor and to the family of the deceased; to enter these gifts into the Memorial Book which is kept in the rear of the sanctuary; and to supervise the use of these gifts. Money contributed in memory of someone may never be used for defraying current operating expenses of the church unless specified by the donor. When specific items are donated, the Memorials Committee shall make sure that the article under consideration will be a suitable and appropriate addition to the present furnishings and equipment of the Church. In either case, whether purchasing or accepting a memorial gift, the Committee gets final approval from the Cabinet and, if the Cabinet so directs, approval of the church members at a Church meeting. Three of the more recent gifts purchased with memorial funds include the glass top for the Communion table purchased with funds given in memory of Doris Hanson; the pew bibles purchased with money from a general collective memorial fund; and a portable communion set purchased with money from the Ruth Metcalf fund.

On March 12 Central Square lost our dear friend and member, Ellen Carroll. Reverend Esther made a plea to the congregation for funds to help with her funeral expenses. The response was so overwhelming that after expenses we hope to have money left over to set up a memorial fund in her name. One day something may be purchased in her memory, a lasting tribute.

In "lieu of flowers" memorial gifts are a loving way to remember lost loved ones. Death, anniversaries, and birthdays are all wonderful occasions to remember those special people who are no longer with us. Flowers are lovely, but memorial gifts are a lasting gift of remembrance.

**April 2011: The Environment and Spirituality** Written by Judy Chan

*Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy? Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live. (Isaiah 55:2-3)*

Recently, I joined a Christian environmental group on a field trip to one of Hong Kong's most mysterious destinations – a public dump. Global Ministries missionary Judy Chan reports, a group from our Kowloon Union Church, decided it was important to visit the not-so-beautiful places in the city to understand how our lifestyles impact Hong Kong's environment.

As we approached the landfill area, we saw large garbage trucks coming and going. Entering, we noticed off in the distance what looked like a wide open valley of plots of dirt. Much of it was covered by sea green plastic sheeting. Other areas were covered with grass and trees. We drove in our van (windows closed!) to see the landfill. To my surprise, the grassy spots were 'restored' areas, meaning my family's garbage was buried underneath, covered by layers of heavy plastic, deodorizer and a few feet of soil and now greenery. The areas covered by sea green sheeting were being prepared as areas for garbage to be dumped in the future.

It is clear that the real problem is Hong Kong people produce too much garbage! It is one of the sins of an affluent society. Despite environmental education campaigns (recycle, reduce, reuse), it appears that people really need to learn the 4<sup>th</sup> "R" – repent! The only thing that has worked so far is making people pay. Plastic bag usage has dropped dramatically since stores began charging 10 cents per bag.

Our chairwoman, is a shining example of simple living. She makes a point of shopping infrequently, and tries to create no rubbish on Sundays. Most importantly, she believes, we must look within and ask ourselves why we need to buy, own and use so much stuff. Our Christian green group doesn't have any easy solutions, but we are working on it. For you see, the environmental crisis is at heart a spiritual matter.
