Commemorating the Tenth Anniversary of 9/11/01 Sunday, 9/11/11

We Remember

As many of you know, this year's September 11th is the 10th anniversary of the terrorist attacks that took many lives before their time. The Bridgewater Council of Churches, the Town of Bridgewater, and Bridgewater State University are hosting observances to commemorate our fallen heroes and their families. On the morning of September 11th, the Bridgewater Community is invited to gather on the Bridgewater Common at the 9/11 Memorial for a brief service and bell ringing. People will be gathering anytime after 8:00 AM. Central Square Congregational Church will program its bells to ring 11 times at 8:46 AM. Rev. Esther and other clergy will offer invocations and benedictions. Following this time of remembrance, the community is invited to a pancake breakfast at the Bridgewater United Methodist Church on School Street. Bridgewater State University is hosting this breakfast for the community. Many of the churches will then have their usual worship services, in and of themselves, focusing on a 9/11 observance.

After worship services in the morning, there will be an additional observance at Legion Field where much of the community will be gathered for Opening Day of Football. A service will be held at 12:30 PM around the gazebo and promptly at 1:00 PM, there will be a National Moment of Silence to honor those who lost their lives and the loss that their families have experienced.

Parking will be a premium at Legion Field, so it is suggested and encouraged that we, as a church family, walk to this event at Legion Field, in unity, as many other parishioners from the downtown churches will be doing the same.

Welcome back families and friends!

September marks the start of our fourth year of Intentional Interim Time. I am looking forward to continuing with you on the journey. We have entered a time of search and discernment as the Search Committee is now on its own to find the next pastor, teacher and leader for this church.

This article on discernment may help us better understand the process that the search is experiencing as a group. These steps can be applied in our daily life.

Discernment: A Christian practice for Daily Living.

An understanding

Frank Rogers and Dorothy Bass have defined *discernment* as “the intentional practice by which a community or an individual seeks, recognizes, and intentionally takes part in the activity of God in a (real) concrete situation.”

An explanation

Discernment is about seeking guidance and finding guidance. In community, discernment includes listening, valuing every contribution, and holding the community in tension and together as guidance is sought and discovered. For Christians, discernment means engaging with god’s Spirit and the Christian community, reading or searching the scriptures, rehearsing our traditions, reviewing what has been learned from experience, and listening for God’s voice in God’s time.

Discernment and decision-making are different, but connected. Christian communities also are involved in decision-making. Usually, communities make decisions through processes that tend to focus on identifying problems and options, and working through a loose set of rules to ensure those who need to have a “say” in the situation do so. Sometimes we follow parliamentary procedures or Roberts Rules of Order to help us make decisions. For Christian communities, embracing a more deliberate journey of discernment is possible through consensus decision-making.

A journey to engage!

The following steps are typical of the process of discernment, and can be used by individuals or groups:

Step one: Naming the issue

- Identify the issue or situation for which guidance is necessary

Step two: Clarifying the information

- What information do you have about this situation or issue? How confident are you regarding the accuracy of this information?
- Explore what scripture teaches that might be relevant to the issue. Are there biblical principles to follow – any situations in which individuals or communities in Bible times struggled with a similar issue?
- Explore Christian traditions for insights that might apply. Are there any doctrines, rituals, practices, or relationships that inform the discussion?
- How does your own life experience inform the conversation? Among community members, there will be diverse life experiences from which to draw wisdom. In what ways can you hear from, gather, and honor such wisdom?

Step three: Reasoning it through

- Take time to engage the information you have gathered. Sort it. Wonder about it. Look for relationships among pieces of information that may shed new light on the issue. For this step, some people create “mind maps” to diagram links that may lead to new insights.

Step four: Prayerfully resting

- In the midst of the work of gathering and processing information, individuals or groups may neglect to take time to listen for God’s voice. Provide a space for prayer in the agenda and in the location where you meet. In your space, include prayer resources and/or some artwork that invites reflection. Allow quiet moments to consider the notes you have taken and

use them as a focus for contemplative listening. Wait to hear the voice of God.

Step five: Perceiving

- What is emerging from the information, from your conversation and reasoning, and from listening for God? Clarify your insights and put them into a form that is easy to understand and easy to communicate.

Step six: Shedding

- Identify what must be “let go” in order to embrace the new insights or direction you perceive. Are there attitudes to be released? Perhaps what must be shed is a long established way of doing things, a familiar ritual, or an attachment to a place or object. Maybe you will need to let go of an old way of knowing or reject a previous paradigm in order to embrace the new one.
- Develop rituals to work through the grief that comes with such shedding. Unless this step is engaged and worked through, it will be very difficult to proceed to making a decision that is grounded in your discernment.

Step seven: Agreeing together

- Now is the time to agree to participate in intentional ways in the way you have discerned.

In the past, I have noted how much I enjoy reading David Yount's weekly article on the Saturday Brockton Enterprise *Religion* page.

Recently, David discussed The Bible Project. A group of scholars has been working on a comparison of the Bible that we have today to the original version, in light of modern era findings such as the discovery and recovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls and a 1525 Bible from an early Gutenberg press. They are a patient group, slowly and methodically carrying out their task. They have finished three books of the Old Testament. How long have they been working?? Since 1958!!!! Most of the original group has passed on and been replaced with other scholars.

I remember very well an exercise that one of our prior pastors put us through during a Bible Study class. He gave us several resources and then we tried to translate a Bible passage from its original language, through the many translations into today's version. It was a daunting task and one that we could not actually do because we were not trained Bible scholars.

The scholars working on the Bible Project must be incredibly patient. Much more patient than I could ever be. This got me thinking about how your Board of Stewardship has been patiently working to promote increases in giving from our church membership. We have called it Giving from the Heart, Sharing the Passion, Percentage Giving and Sacrificial Giving. We will continue to work on this effort with patience and understanding as we seek to get to a place where the expense side of our Annual Budget is met at 100% (or even higher!!) by the pledged income side of the budget.

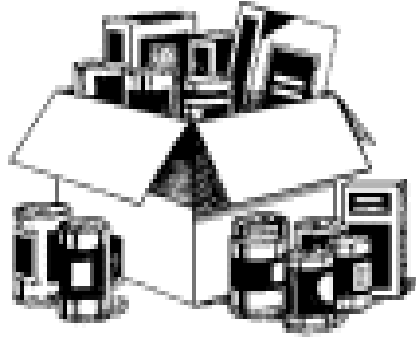

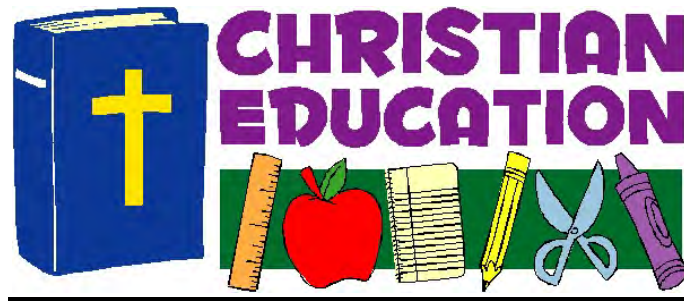
Bridgewater Food Pantry

September 2011: Seeking to Serve

September 1, 2011

God is not so unjust as to overlook your work and the love which you showed for God's sake in serving the saints, as you still do. Hebrews 6:10

Global Ministries missionary, Jeffrey Mensendiek and his family are long-time residents of Sendai, Japan. Since the devastating earthquake and tsunami Jeffrey has been ministering to the displaced, grieving and broken. Jeffrey's sister, Martha Mensendiek also a missionary who lives and works in Kyoto, has been translating Jeffrey's daily journal entries so that Global Ministries can post them on the website. This is one of Jeffrey's recent entries: I took part in a meeting attended by Buddhist and Christian religious leaders. The purpose was to organize a common ministry to serve the spiritual needs of the public in Sendai. The government and various organizations can address the material needs of the people. But there definitely is a spiritual need which only the religious community can address.

It is important that the Buddhist and Christian community join together at this time in a spirit of respect. It shows the public that we are not here to compete, but to serve. The spiritual needs are so deep. Many people are afraid of religion, and believe that religious people are aggressive and self-serving. Not so for those of us gathered on this night. Our hearts go out to those who have lost loved ones; those who cannot return to the place where they lived for fear of the memories which might return to them. Many people are still not accounted for. The suffering continues. The religious community is ready to serve at any time, but for those who have lost loved ones, the time may not yet be right. Humility is an important part of Buddhism. Waiting, listening, emptying oneself, letting go of desires are all important values. When my father first came to Sendai 60 years ago, he visited a blind man in a small fishing village near Ishinomaki.

He witnessed the desperate poverty and asked; "Is there anything that I can do for you?" The man replied; "Desire is endless." There is so much to learn from the wisdom of the Buddhist tradition. On this forty-ninth day I bow my head remembering that many of my Buddhist friends are praying for peace and healing.

Let us pray for strength for the suffering and those who minister to them.

Jeffrey Mensendiek, serves the Council on Cooperative Mission. He is assigned to the Emmaus Center in Sendai, Japan, where he now works as director of recovery response.
